


New Courses Added

With the beginning of the 2016-17 school year, the Burbank Adult School (BAS) will be adding new courses to its schedule. As part of the Adult Education Regional Plan, BAS will be offering three new courses to help English as a Second Language (ESL) students

accelerate their entry into Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs. ESL students will be able to take ESL Anatomy Physiology, Medical Math, and Medical Terminology. The courses will be six weeks in length and will be offered in the evening so that students can take their regular ESL courses concurrently. Additionally, BAS will be offering an Accuplacer Test Preparation class in the

fall. The Accuplacer is an entry-level test administered by

The School Facilities Oversight Committee is a Board-appointed committee of independent citizens, initially established in 1997. After successfully passing Bond Measure S in March of 2013, the Committee now falls under the provisions of Proposition 39. The purpose of the Committee shall be to inform the public at least annually in a written report concerning the expenditure of the bond proceeds.

The Committee shall consist of at least seven (7) members (and may be larger) to serve for a term of two (2) years, without compensation, and for no more than two (2) consecutive terms. The Committee may not include any employee or official of the school district or any vendor, contractor, or consultant of the school district.

The Committee must include all of the following:

- 1) One member who is active in a business organization representing the business community located within the school district.
 - 2) One member active in a senior citizens organization.
 - 3) One member active in a bona fide taxpayer association.
 - 4) For a school district, one member shall be the parent or guardian of a child enrolled in the district.
 - 5) For a school district, one member shall be both a parent or guardian of a child enrolled in the district, and active in a parent-teacher organization, such as the PTA or school site council.

Projects Underway

Measure S is a General Obligation Bond in the amount of \$110 million. There will be three issuances: the first one funded in June of 2013 for \$41 million.

2015 saw the start of several large bond projects to include: Heating, ventilating, and air conditioning (HVAC) upgrades at nine sites, as well as new installations in several site gyms and auditoriums. Upgrades to low voltage systems at several sites including: energy management systems, fire alarm, clock, and PA systems were also begun.


Various other projects were undertaken and completed

such as: conversion of irrigation systems to BWP's recycled water program at four sites, as well as fencing and asphalt replacement at two schools.
