Goal 1: Improve Student Learning and Achievement or Targeted Subgroups

- 1. Question: What are the overall demographics of the district broken down by subgroups (2017-2018)? (Information on CDE website, Dataquest)
 - Total Students Districtwide = 15,173
 - English Language Learners Districtwide = 1,637
 - Students with Disabilities Districtwide = 1,699
 - Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Students Districtwide = 5,691
- 2. What is the English Language Learner population size based on elementary, middle school and high school? (Information on CDE website, Dataquest)
 - Elementary 1129 English Language Learners
 - Middle School 234 English Language Learners
 - High School 274 English Language Learners
- 3. What are Kagan Strategies (Kagan Structures)?
 - The **Kagan structure**, sometimes referred to as cooperative learning, commonly involves the teacher setting up the classroom **structure** into pods (small teams of four) that are tasked with a group task and asked to work collaboratively to reach their learning goal.

4. What is EdCamp?

 content and language while using an integrated, balanced literacy approach. While
 originally developed for ELLs (English Language learners,) it benefits all students
 through the use of high-level thinking and academic language, as well as cross-cultural
 skills. Students taught in a GLAD classroom are prepared to be effective, literate citizens
 of a global society.
